

Why did we undertake the project?

- Current policy and associated documents outdated
- Inconsistency between policy, standards and what is actually on the ground throughout the Province
- To better communicate risks to trail users and to standardize how difficulty is rated and communicated
- Develop new tools to help reduce staff and partner workloads while increasing efficiencies and consistency across the Province





What Have We Done So Far?

- Developed draft new policy, difficulty rating system and sign creation tool
- Shared work with mountain bike community last fall through a pilot
- Worked with 8 specific communities and partners
- Compiled and assessed comments
- Shared 'What we Heard' report from pilot






What Did We Hear?

- Policy Common Themes
 - Concerns regarding liability for agreement holders
 - Concerns regarding implementation funding and timelines
 - Concerns regarding homogeneity of trails and club capacity
- Difficulty Rating System Common Themes
 - Changes to existing trail ratings
 - Prescriptive Criteria
 - User experience (of difficulty rating system)
 - Recommendations for Changes
- Sign Creation Tool generally positive

Authorizations

Authorization is required for many types of activities that take place in recreation sites, on recreation trails, or within interpretive forest sites. Authorization is required if you wish to use a recreation site or trail for a business or industrial activity, to host a competitive sporting event or a gathering of over 15 people, and for other activities. The construction or maintenance of a recreation site, trail, or facility also requires authorization.


